Riding the Paceline Part 6

We continue exploring staggered pacelines in a sideways wind this month. Always stay on the downwind side of the rider ahead and move back and forth slightly to find the sweet spot to obtain the best draft.

I had a fraternity brother at Michigan State who used a rather unique device to find the best place to draft. He stuck one of those balsa wood airplane propellors on his handlebar stem, then found the best draft where the propellor spun the least. I mean, it makes total sense—but—really?

I've gotten so I can just feel the wind against my chest and face and find the place where the wind is the least. It takes practice, but you'll find the sweet spot if you pay attention enough.

So, say we have about 8 riders and a good wind coming from our right. To be helpful, the lead rider rides as far to the right as possible, and the remaining riders start staggering behind and to the left. But what happens when every rider does the same thing? Well, the group ends up going over the centerline of the road—which of course is not a very safe way to ride on open public roads. So for practicality's sake, we only usually stagger 3 riders at the most, and the riders behind may start another staggered formation behind the first. We could ride all day in 2 or 3 formations that way.

The big question is how the line is rotating. The lead rider really should not go left if they have someone overlapping their wheel on that side. So ideally the lead rider will signal with an elbow wave (racer tradition) or a pat on their rear (tourist), then just drift straight back as the line passes the lead rider on the lead rider's left.

However, this puts the whole group more into the middle of the road. So don't be surprised if you see a lead rider always going left no matter the wind direction, as only 1 rider then is in the middle.

One of the many scenes of flowerboxes dotting the perimeter of Lake Geneva all over the town.







